



Community and Cultural Heritage Planning

The School of Planning at the University of Waterloo invites applications for a tenure-track position in planning, specializing in research at the interface of community/population change, cultural heritage and planning. The ideal candidate will conduct research that critically examines governance, legal and/or socio-economic processes shaping our communities and have interest in one or more of the following areas: demography, multiculturalism, Indigenous and/or other disenfranchised populations, cultural heritage management, assessment, heritage preservation, gentrification and displacement, social infrastructure provision and financing. Candidates will have a strong record of (or potential for) scholarly productivity as well as engagement with the public, policy development and practice.

The successful candidate will be an outstanding and committed educator, expected to teach and advise in both undergraduate and graduate programs including the supervision of doctoral research, and lead an impactful research program. The nature of the appointment and salary (range \$80,000 to \$120,000) will be commensurate with the candidate's qualifications and experience at either the Assistant or Associate Professor Rank. Applicants should qualify for and be prepared to seek membership in the Canadian Institute of Planners. Normally, applicants must be doctoral graduates with degrees earned before September 2016. Candidates should have proven records of research or be able to demonstrate the potential for high quality research to advance towards tenure in the School.

The University of Waterloo is home to numerous research centers with relevant focus to this position within the Faculty of Environment and beyond. These include the Interdisciplinary Centre for Climate Change (IC³), Waterloo Institute for Social Innovation and Resilience (WISIR), and the Heritage Resources Center. The School of Planning is the vibrant home to approximately 500 students undertaking degrees from undergraduate co-op to Ph.D. levels delivered by over 20 full time faculty and staff. It is part of a dynamic Faculty of Environment that includes a School of Environment, Enterprise and Development (SEED) and a School of Environment, Resources and Sustainability (SERS). The faculty also houses a Mapping Analysis and Design (MAD) technical unit that provides computing facilities and professional staff to support teaching and research in GIS, remote sensing, computer-aided design, modeling and simulation. References will be contacted by the School's Appointment Committee for those being considered in the second stage of review.
